The name of Cyprus appears in the Amarna archives for the first time as Arasa, cuneiform Alas ija. The recent excavations at Enkomi show that it is the name primarily of that city. In its structure the name must be Greek. The origin of a colony's name is normally to be found near its metropolis. This may be looked for in southern Elis, to which the names Alesion (Iliad), Alasyēs, and Lasiōn and other indications may point.
