A summary of the more important archaeological events and a list of all the excavations in Greece during 1964, a year of "scientific revolution." A review of the major books and publications which appeared during the past year; government activities in establishing new museums and caring for the old monuments. Among the events re-examined are the significance of the cylinder seals discovered in the Mycenaean palaces at Thebes, the unique Minoan palace at Zakros, the continually expanding excavations of the palace complex at Keas, the peculiar Neolithic settlement at Saliangos Antiparos, and the underwater finds at Chenchreae.

Dakares, Ephor of Antiquities for Epirus, in his doctoral dissertation "The Genealogical Myths of the Molossians," presents the latest conclusions from the excavations in Epirus.
